The History of The Laguna Beach Free/Community Clinic

Presented by Dr. Korey Jorgensen



Tuesday, December 6th Susi Q Community Center 7:00-8:30 pm

The Laguna Beach Free Clinic first opened its doors at 422 Glenneyre Street in 1970. In the beginning the idea met resistance but a group of dedicated and caring individuals persisted until their vision became a reality. Over 50 years later their vision continues to meet the medical needs of patients in its own building on 3rd Street.

Please join us as Dr. Korey Jorgensen's speaks about the work and history of the Laguna Beach Free/Community Clinic. His career with The Laguna Beach Community Clinic (LBCC) started in 1972 when he was serving in the Navy Medical Corp. Korey was stationed at the El Toro Marine Base, now the site of the Great Park in Irvine. The clinic had the support of many young doctors from the base.

Dr. Korey served the clinic with Dr. Bill Anderson, and it was Bill who recruited him to volunteer with LBCC. The relaxed feel in the clinic was partly because it was free, and partly because it was such an exciting mix of patients.

A Message from our President

The Laguna Beach Historical Society programs held at The Susi Q Community Center support our mission statement of disseminating knowledge about the history of Laguna Beach to those within our community and beyond. Jane Petty Janz is our program coordinator.

In our next program you will learn how a group of caring, dedicated individuals worked together to provide free, much needed medical services to individuals starting in the early 1970s.

I find it hard to believe that once upon a time medical costs were so much less that you could simply drop in to a local clinic and receive free help, no questions asked, no fee required.

Curious as to how that was possible?

I invite you to join us in listening to Dr. Korey Jorgensen, Laguna Beach Free Clinic's first Medical Director tell the story of the little clinic that is still going strong today and recently celebrated 50 years.

Today we have so many ways folks can give back to our community, in fact we recently participated in the first LoveLaguna Beach citywide volunteer event

It takes volunteers to keep an organization going, and thriving. We always welcome new volunteers.

We are in need of regular and substitute docents who give three hours a month on a Friday, Saturday or Sunday afternoon to open the house and welcome our visitors from 1-4:00 pm at The Murphy Smith Bungalow.

The Healthcare Agency paid the expenses for reproductive health services, such as cancer screening, infection screening and treatment, birth control pills, and condoms.

Its patients were typically young people who lived in town or near town. Had these folks not been able to come to LBCC, many would have gone without care, or delayed getting it. The site of Anastasia Café was the second location in a funky little house with a living room/waiting room and fireplace. A dental chair was staffed by a licensed dentist, and the medical services by licensed physicians and nurse, often from the Marine Base. Because of severe space constraints, privacy in the examination room was more of an aspiration than a reality so it was discrete to keep your eyes averted.

The move of LBCC to its current Third Street location was a huge factor in its financial viability, initially. The purchase of the building strained the clinic's financial reserves, and the build-out was more expensive than expected.

The clinic's relationship with UC Irvine was crucial in stabilizing its finances, but the extraordinary funding for our HIV Treatment program became another stabilizing influence. The Ryan White Grant was created by our Federal government to address the unfolding disaster of AIDS in our nation, and it helped pay for my HIV treatment program at LBCC. People with AIDS in the early 70's knew they would die of it, for sure. Now that there is safe and effective medication, people on treatment can expect to live a normal lifetime.

The history of The LB Free Clinic/Community Clinic as a community based solution will be presented on Tuesday, Dec. 6th. at The Susi Q, adjacent to its current location.




